Brief introduction of your institution (up to 500 words) and/or the URL	<p>The University Jean Moulin Lyon 3 is based in the second largest city in France (over 1 million inhabitants) after Paris. Lyon has all the advantages of a large city, while maintaining a human dimension in its feel. The history of the city of Lyon goes back more than 2000 years. Lyon is the capital of the Rhône Alpes region, a prosperous region with a dynamic economy. Europe's major cities are less than a two-hour flight away from Lyon's international airport. Paris is a mere two-hour TGV high-speed train journey away, the same time it takes to reach the French Alps with the world's largest skiing domain, or the Mediterranean coast.</p> <p>The University Jean Moulin Lyon 3 enrolls approximately 22,000 students in six different faculties or departments. These six faculties are: 1) Law School 2) Business School 3) Faculty of Languages 4) Faculty of Humanities 5) Faculty of Philosophy 6) The Institute of Technology. Course structure is based on three degrees.</p> <p>The Law School enjoys an excellent reputation both in France and abroad. The latest editions of the Gourman report ranks it in the highest league of European Law schools, fifth only after Paris, Oxford, Cambridge and Heidelberg. The Political Science Department is an inherent part of the Law School. The Business School is one of the largest in France and offers its 5,000 students high-level professional courses that will prepare them for a wide range of careers in the management sector. It offers 35 highly specialized Master's degrees. The Faculty of Languages offers 22 foreign languages offered in either initial or continuing education. The Faculty of Humanities enjoys an excellent reputation for its degree courses in French Literature, Classics, History, Geography, Information Technologies, and Library Classification Systems. The Faculty of Philosophy has a prestigious background. Among its illustrious alumni are philosophers as famous as Maurice Merleau-Ponty; Gilles Deleuze; Henri Maldiney, or François Dagognet. The Institute of Technology offers short professional degrees in varied fields such as communication, legal careers and management.</p>

We do not have an absolute rule on GPA requirements, but we trust Waseda University to select students able to succeed.

It depends on the programs. For our graduate MBA programs taught in English for example, we ask for TOEFL 233 on CBT or higher.

Language proficiency requirement(s) other than English: Please give details if you require minimum scores of any tests, specific language proficiency certificates, or any other language requirement.	<p>Good level in French. For students who do not have enough background in French, we do offer courses taught in English.</p> <p>All exchange students who wish to take courses taught in French must do a placement test (TEFFEE Test) BEFORE their departure. This test is not meant as a selection test, but rather as an academic advising tool for academic advisors. If the score is too low on the French test, we may recommend the student follow a mix of classes in English and French.</p>
Q8-d. Are there any tuition-waived language-support courses (other than English) available for exchange students? (Please specify the tuition if it cannot be waived.)	<p>In the DEUF program (program where students will follow most of their classes in French), there is a mandatory 2-hour reinforcement of French language per week (free of charge).</p> <p>The SELF program also offers a 30-hour intensive French language course in the first two weeks of its program (offered before regular classes start), and will then have 3 hours per week for the rest of the program (free of charge).</p> <p>In addition to this, students may want to look into such translations classes as "Thème" or "Version" in the LEA or LLCE departments. If the native language is Japanese, for example, a good way to improve French language skills is to take a Japanese translation class into French or vice versa.</p> <p>La "Maison des Langues" is a foreign language lab which is used by all students to improve their language</p>

skills.

The Law Faculty also provides courses for introduction to French Law. There is a mandatory class of 24 hours total for the 1st semester (2 hours a week). For students arriving for 2nd semester, this course is taught intensively over two weeks, prior to the start of regular classes.

The orientation course at the beginning of the academic year is also highly recommended for immersion into the French language (this is the only part where tuition applies of about €200).

Lyon 3 also has a number of courses taught in the English language for students who do not have the level of proficiency to take classes only in French.

SELF PROGRAM

These courses are straight forward and relatively self-explanatory. They are generally considered to be 3rd- or 4th-year level classes (there is currently an offering of approximately 25 courses). There is choice of business, law and humanities subjects. The courses represent 30 hours for the semester (3 hours per week x 10 weeks). Each course counts for 6 ECTS credits/semester. Exchange students can take courses across the French system, granted they have the prerequisites to follow the course. They can choose classes from the following departments or faculties at Lyon 3:

- 1) Faculté de Droit (Law)
- 2) Institut d'Administration des Entreprises - IAE (Business School)
- 3) Faculté des Lettres et Civilisations: will offer courses in Literature (modern and classic), history, geography, territorial planning and Information & Communication.
- 4) Faculté des Langues-Foreign Languages Department
 - a. LEA (Langues Etrangères Appliquées) This degree combines foreign language instructions with business courses. Language courses are more applied to business every-day language;
 - b. LLCE (Langues, Littérature et Civilisations Etrangères) Foreign Language courses are more classical in their approach;

Lyon 3 has a housing coordinator at the international relations department. Internet access, sport facilities, libraries, and student organizations. The Association Lyon 3 International organizes a large number of international student activities and events. A membership fee of €10 entitles exchange students to participate. The same Association also enables you to sign up for the "buddy" system. A French native student will be assigned to be a "buddy", and this can go from airport pick-up at arrival, to French conversation or any other activities defined between the two students.</p>

(e.g., minimum of 4 courses/semester, minimum of 12 credits/semester, etc.)</p>	<p>A French student normally takes 30 ECTS credits per semester, or 60 ECTS per year. Because the ECTS system is new in Europe, it is not an exact science as to how many hours of class per week this corresponds to.
