

# Waseda University, Study Abroad 2014-15

## Waseda Thematic Studies Abroad, Fall 2014 at University of New Mexico, USA

Location: Albuquerque, New Mexico, USA

*Title:* Waseda students may apply for three different types of programs for fall semester 2014

- 1. "CELAC Program"
  - Full-time intensive English language courses (certificate program)
- 2. "2×2 Bridge Program"
  - Part-time intensive English language and part-time regular academic courses
- 3. "Regular Program"
  - Full-time academic course study

The type of program depends on the student's TOEFL scores (see below)

# **Language Requirements:** (TOEFL or other requirements)

- 1. Requirement for full-time English language study: TOEFL iBT 40, CBT 120, PBT/ ITP 433 or above.
- 2. Requirement for part-time English and part-time academic courses: TOEFL iBT 61, CBT 173, PBT/ITP 500 or above.
- 3. Requirement for full-time academic study: TOEFL iBT 68, CBT 190, PBT/ITP 520 or higher.

# **GPA Requirements:**

- 1. Equivalent of 2.0 out of 4.0 for all university course work
- 2. Equivalent of 70 or higher or 3.0 out of 4.0 (B average in the U.S. system) for all university course work
- 3. Equivalent of 70 or higher or 3.0 out of 4.0 (B average in the U.S. system) for all university course work

#### Nationality:

*Other Requirements:* Approval from Waseda Center for International Education is required in order to apply for the University of New Mexico programs.

**Dates:** (tentative beginning, ending dates; include vacations longer than a few days)

Classes begin on August 18, 2014 and end on December 13, 2014. The students may check in after Monday, August 11. Our required incoming student orientation will be on Thursday, August 14.

October 9 and 10 are holidays, and November 27 and 28 will the Thanksgiving holidays.

# Summary:

- 1. Students in the full-time intensive English program will be placed in courses according to their scores on the placement test given at CELAC during orientation. They will attend four hours of classes per day, complete homework assignments, and participate in frequent cultural out of class cultural events.
- 2. Students in the part-time English and part-time academic program will attend two classes of intensive English as described above, and will also register for at least two academic courses of their choice, which will be taught in English.
- 3. Students in the full-time English program will be able to register for 4-5 academic courses of their choice, which will be taught in English.

#### Academic Study

All Waseda students will be taking courses that are open to any students at the University of New Mexico. Intensive English classes meet every day. Academic courses

usually meet 3 - 5 hours per week per course.

Waseda students can enroll in any academic courses for which they have completed the designated pre-requisites. In a few cases, such as studio art or architecture courses, students will have to submit a portfolio of their previous works in order to register for some classes.

Please note that students who are taking classes in business must pay an additional \$10 for each credit hour: for example a student taking 12 business credits would pay an additional \$120; and a student taking one 3-credit business course would pay an additional \$30.

There are also sometimes special fees attached to individual classes to pay for things like materials, laboratory supplies, computer costs, etc. Some of the courses include business, architecture, fine arts, and lab science courses. The costs vary are listed in the Schedule of Classes under each class description:

Students who wish to take classes in studio art or architecture needs to consult to UNM. Classes for nursing is not open for this program.

#### Facilitation Plan

Waseda students will participate in new student orientation activities sponsored by CELAC and the Global Education Office and Residence Life. Advisors in GEO will

be available to meet with students to discuss any academic, bureaucratic, social, cultural, or personal issues. All academic departments also have advisors to discuss course selection and academic issues with the students taking classes in those areas.

# Credits (24-30 semester credit hours):

- 1. Students enrolled in the full-time Intensive English program will be registered for full time classes approximately 20 hours per week. They will not earn academic credits at UNM, but all students will receive a "Certificate of Attendance," and those who get a 520 or above on the TOEFL final exam "Certificate of Completion."
- 2. Students enrolled in part-time English and part-time academic program will have to take at least 6 academic credit hours and can take up to 9 credit hours.
- 3. Students enrolled for full-time academic study will enroll in 4-5 courses, earning 12-18 credits. A minimum of 12 credits is required to remain in full-time student status.
