



Greater Foreign Affairs of China: Institutional and International Implications of "the Communist Party in Command of Diplomacy"

Guoguang Wu is a Senior Research Scholar at Stanford Center on China's Economy and Institutions, and concurrently a Senior Fellow on Chinese Politics at the Asia Society Policy Institute's Center for China Analysis. A Ph.D. in political science from Princeton University, his research areas are Chinese politics, comparative politics, and comparative political economy, with current research interests focusing on elite politics, transition from communism, and comparative globalization.

He is author of four books, including China's party Congress: Power, Legitimacy, and Institutional Manipulation (Cambridge University Press, 2015) and Globalization Against Democracy: A Political Economy of Capitalism after Its Global Triumph (Cambridge University Press, 2017), editor/coeditor of six volumes, and, in the Chinese language, author or editor of 16 books.

The Xi Jinping leadership has repeatedly emphasized "the (Communist) Party in command of diplomacy" (dang guan waijiao) as a fundamental principle of China's foreign conduct, and proposed a program of so-called "greater foreign affairs" (da waishi) for China's international relations. What do these initiatives mean for China's diplomacy? This talk tries to answer the question from two angles: in regard of domestic institutions, it highlights the concentration of foreign-affairs power from the PRC state system to the Communist Party and party chief; in regard of China's diplomatic strategy, it explores how the CCP attempts at developing a system of diplomacy beyond Western-centric international norms to conduct foreign relations. In the empirical examination, the talk also investigates how the Central Office of Foreign Affairs (Zhongyang waiban) has risen within the Chinese party-state system to become an institutional lynchpin overwhelming the PRC Foreign Ministry to actualize the above initiatives.
