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The energy transition from centralized fossil fuels to decentralized renewables is typically associated with innovative. transparent, multi-level governance that advances collective interests. However, many current energy policies remain centralized and less inclusive, resulting in significant local opposition driven by economic, social, and environmental concerns. Litigation has emerged as a key method for communities to influence decision-making, exposing local tensions and inequalities related to new energy installations. A comparative study of Germany, France, and Japan is pertinent due to their shared climate ambitions and the challenges posed by the energy crisis following the war in Ukraine. Despite these common goals, each country's approach to energy transition varies widely, shaped by unique socio-historical factors.

This workshop will explore energy transitions in these countries through three main inquiries: 1) Multi-level governance of energy; 2) Litigation's role in highlighting local opposition to new infrastructures; and 3) Litigation's impact on public policy and legal reform. The objective is to deepen the understanding of a just and democratic energy transition by incorporating multiple perspectives and examining their interactions with the institutions that shape energy policies.
