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1) Overview of the Graduate School of Letters, Arts and Sciences





In addition to students from the School of Culture, Media and Society and the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, many students enter the Graduate School of Letters, Arts and Sciences from other Waseda University undergraduate schools, as well as from other universities.

1-1) Programs at the Graduate School of Letters, Arts and Sciences



Master's Program 22 courses

- Standard term: 2 years (max. 4 years)
- No. of students enrolled: approx. 340 (As of April, 2024)
- Degree: Master of Arts in Literature
- Requirements for completion of the graduate school:
 - Earn a minimum of 32 credits of approved coursework
 - Required research seminars
 - Pass Master's thesis screening and examination
 - * Specific requirements may vary somewhat for different courses within the program

Doctoral Program 21 courses

- Standard term: 3 years (max. 6 years)
- No. of students enrolled: approx. 280 (As of April, 2024)
- Degree: Doctor of Literature
- Requirements to complete the graduate degree:
 - Prescribed research seminars
 - Pass doctoral dissertation screening and examination

Waseda University Central Library



- Having been established when Waseda University was founded under its previous name of Tokyo Senmon Gakko (Tokyo College) in 1882, Waseda University Library has a long history. The libraries that it comprises collectively hold around 6 million books, making this one of the largest university library collections in Japan. Waseda University Library also provides a wealth of electronic data, including e-journals, e-books and databases.
- The Central Library is the largest of the university's more than 20 libraries and reading rooms. Its collection includes as many as 2.8 million books, as well as various national treasures and important cultural assets.

Waseda University Toyama Library



- The Toyama Library also functions as a study and research area on the Toyama campus.
- The Toyama Library opened in April 1992 as a branch of the Central Library.

No. of books: Approx. 490,000 Opening hours: 9:00 am to 10:00 pm (closed on Sundays and public holidays)









- As Asia's only museum dedicated to the theatre, this museum houses a wide range of theatre-related materials from the classical theatrical arts of Noh, Joruri, and Kabuki to Shakespeare and modern theatre from both the East and the West.
- To increase awareness of the more than one million important works that it houses, the museum holds a permanent exhibition as well as temporary exhibitions. You can browse the library and watch audio-visual materials in the library area and AV booths.



- The Yaichi Aizu Collection is one of the cultural assets that is unique to Waseda University, along with archeological finds excavated since before the war, donated works of modern art, and Ainu artifacts from the Tosabayashi Collection.
- Since the Aizu Museum opened in 1998, the total number of artifacts in its care has risen to around 18,000 as a result of donations such as the Shigenori Tomioka Collection, the Uchiyama Collection, the Hattori Collection, the Ono Collection, and the Kosei Ando Collection. By having these permanently on display, we are aiming to be a museum that facilitates research and education both inside and outside of the university.





- Building No. 4 (on the Waseda campus), adjacent to the Dr. Tsubouchi Memorial Theatre Museum, which is closely associated with Haruki Murakami, was innovatively renovated by architect Kengo Kuma and opened on October 1, 2021.
- The vast collection of items to be accommodated includes Haruki Murakami's personal notes, manuscripts, book reviews and translations related to his works, and tens of thousands of records he has collected over the years.
- This environment facilitates research activities on Haruki Murakami's works, world literature and translation, as well as academic and cultural exchange among researchers and students around the world.
- Facilities include a seminar space that can accommodate up to 60 people, an audio room, and a café, gallery, and pocket park that can be freely used by many people.

- If a DC1 Fellow or DC2 Fellow earns a doctoral degree and completes the designated procedures, their fellowship category will be change to PD Research. In addition, if a Fellow get a job, he or she needs to withdraw the position of Research Fellowship for Young Scientists.

Scholarship to support JSPS's DC Fellows (Waseda's Programs)

The purpose of this scholarship is to support a system in which students who are DC1 or DC2 Fellow, JSPS can devote themselves to further research by providing a portion of their tuition. Therefore, students who meet the requirements can receive the scholarship by applying during the specified period.

Eligibility : a person who satisfies all of the following conditions

- 1. Students who are enrolled in the doctoral program and the regular program of 3-5 years of the integrated doctoral program
- 2. Students who has been selected as a DC1 or DC2 Fellow, JSPS, in the year to be selected as a Scholar
- 3. Students applying for this scholarship (Students need to apply every year)
 - * Those who leave of absence cannot become scholars.

Q&A (frequently asked questions)



Q1. Do I need to contact the faculty before taking the examination?

A1. No.

Please check the Waseda University Researcher Database for information on the university's researchers. Some may have their email addresses listed there. If faculty members have not listed their contact information, please contact them through the Graduate School of Letters, Arts and Sciences Web site, where contact information for each course is available.

Q2. Can I refer to past entrance exams?

A2. Entrance exams for the past three years are available on the Admissions Center website (Please note that some parts of the questions may not be available if copyright permission has not been granted.).

You can see the original questions from the past three years at the Administrative Office of the Faculty of Letters, Arts and Sciences.



Q3. How is a supervisor decided after entering the program?

A3. For the Master's Program, some courses will confirm your preference for a supervisor at the time of application.

For the Doctoral Program, all courses will confirm your preference for a supervisor at the time of application.

In each course, your supervisor is decided by taking into consideration your preferences, research plan, and the results of the second examination (Interview Examination). Therefore, your supervisor may not be the same as you requested at the time of application. The decided supervisor will be notified at the time of the entrance procedure.

Q4. Is it possible to apply to a course that is different from the field of specialization that I am studying at undergraduate school?

A4. Yes.

If you have any concerns, contact the faculty or course in advance and check the content of the research that you wish to engage in after promotion.

(If a Doctoral Program student wishes to study a specialty that is different to their Master's Program specialty, they will need to submit a thesis that is equivalent to a Master's thesis in the field associated with the course that they wish to apply for.)



Q5. Can you tell me about the non-degree student system?

A5. Subjects that can be taken are limited to specified subjects ("Approved Courses" listed on the website) and you may take one or more subjects. Note that not all courses and subjects can be taken. For some courses, there is a limit to the number of subjects that can be taken.

Q6. Are there any scholarships for international students?

A6. There are scholarships for international students. If you wish to apply for one, please follow the guidance from the administrative office after enrollment.
