#### People of all ages in Japan, an aging society with a declining birthrate

In 2040, Japan will have a population of 65 years old and over.

It is expected to reach 34.8%, further advancing the super-aged society.<sup>\*\*</sup> While maintaining social security and infrastructure and securing the labor force will become major issues due to the changing demographic composition, it is also expected that life models will diversify and "multi-stage" lifestyles, in which careers are not tied to age, will expand.

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# Graduates are active in?

### Approximately 2,500 diverse employment opportunities

In FY2022, there were 11,623 students who graduated with an undergraduate degree or a master's degree. Their career paths were 70% for employment, 20% for further education, and 10% for others (70% of science undergraduates went on to graduate school) The employment rate\* of undergraduate graduates is 96.8%. Waseda is unique in having a broad network of Waseda students in all areas of society.
