Waseda Customized Study Abroad – Regular Academic Programme at Pembroke College, Cambridge

Location: Cambridge, U.K.

Programme Overview: Waseda students participating in this programme will spend two terms at Pembroke College, University of Cambridge, or at a partner Cambridge College, where they will participate in the Spring Semester Programme.

Language and GPA or equivalent Requirements:

TOEFL Internet Based Test: 107 (including a minimum of 25/30 in each component)

IELTS: normally a minimum overall grade of 7.5, and not less than 7.0 in each element

The minimum GPA is 3.75

If your first language is not English, it is essential that your English language skills are good enough for you to undertake an intensive and challenging academic course that is taught and examined in English. As a result you may also be asked to meet a specific English language requirement.

Nationality

Is enrollment open to students of any nationality including your own country?

If “no,” please specify all restrictions.

No, it is not open to British nationals studying in the UK.

Dates: The Spring Semester 2017 takes place 15 January 2017 – 23 June 2017.

Summary:

The programme offered is identical to the semester programme run by Pembroke College for the University which currently admits approximately 30 students each year, many of whom come from leading universities in the US. Full details of this programme are available at:

Academic Study

During these terms students will follow Papers (courses) in their major subject areas by attending relevant lecture courses, seminars, supervisions, and through private study. Private study involves reading, research and completing essay assignments, usually of between 1500 and 2000 words each week, for the supervisor. Supervisions provide the opportunity to delve deeper into the subject in discussion. Supervisors review essay work and set up the next assignment by setting the intellectual parameters and a reading list.

The academic programme in the Lent and Easter Terms is almost identical to that of regular Cambridge undergraduates. Therefore applications should familiarize themselves with the University's undergraduate prospectus so that they understand how courses are organized at Cambridge; <http://www.study.cam.ac.uk/undergraduate/>

Students following this programme will find that they have a rather wider choice of Papers than most undergraduates. Students who have been offered a place on this programme will receive advice and guidance from the Director of Studies.

Housing and Meal Plan

All visiting students are allocated college accommodation (a single room) either in Pembroke or in another Cambridge college that has agreed to provide college facilities for students participating in the semester programme. It is normally possible for undergraduates from overseas to stay in college accommodation over the Easter Vacation, but permission is needed for this. The colleges are the social and pastoral centre for students. As well as providing accommodation and food they provide facilities for sports and other student activities. Most colleges have their own bar, clubs and societies, offering a variety of non-academic activities for students to take part in. In cases where students encounter difficulties - of any nature - the College provides support through the Tutorial system; this may include counselling (informal or formal), and medical help. All undergraduates are required to be in residence for the duration of each Full Term.

Opportunities for Learning through Experience

Students will have plenty of opportunities to get involved with sports, drama and many other social

activities during their stay. The International Programmes Department also organises orientation sessions and a welcome event in January, to which College undergraduate representatives are invited. Each college has its own Junior Parlour or 'JP', which is the hub of college undergraduate social life, and students are encouraged to participate as fully as possible in student life through the JP and other college or University societies or clubs. All participating students, as full members of Cambridge University, have access to the vast range of clubs, societies and activities run by the University and its students.

Facilitation Plan

The International Programmes (IP) Office in Pembroke College facilitates all aspects of student integration into University life in Cambridge. Students come under the care of a Director of Studies (DoS) appointed by the Director of International Programmes who is responsible for ensuring that students are integrated as fully as possible into all aspects of University and College academic life.

The Tutor will also be responsible for the participants' general welfare and will be available to see students at any time by appointment. Students are welcome to visit the IP office at any time for friendly assistance and advice during their stay.

Credits (24-30 semester credit hours):

Waseda students will have a workload at least equal to that of regular British undergraduates.
