We've always been looking at student's transcripts to check their academic level. It is not 70% but 50% As and Bs we are looking for. This is when the marking scale for As and Bs is 70-100%. So what we do is count up how many A's they have, how many Bs they have and how many total grades they have. We then work out how many A's and B's they have as a percentage of all their grades. As long as they have 50% or or more A's or B's they are accepted. If they have less than 50% A's and B's they would be rejected. More A's or B's they are accepted.

Academic Study

Open Enrolment (CS-R)

The programme is almost entirely made up of standard, undergraduate level modules that are open to regularly enrolled students. This allows Waseda students to study alongside UK and other international degree-seeking students and fully integrate into University of Westminster life. However, Waseda students are not restricted to studying modules from just one degree, all Waseda students are permitted to take modules from more than one school so that their programme can be tailored to meet the requirements of Waseda University in order to transfer credit. English Language + Study Abroad Enrolment (CS-L)

Students who apply to study the English Language + Study Abroad programme will be required to sit an in-class English test at the completion of the English Language (EFL) semester. The results of this test will determine which academic modules students are eligible to enrol on based on the following criteria:

B2 High	If you achieve a test result of B2 High, you will be able to choose 3 modules from Level 4, Level 5 or Level 6.

Housing and Meal Plan:

Students can apply to stay in University Halls of Residence for the whole academic year at Westminster. Students should indicate if they would like accommodation on their application form and include their preferred halls of residence.

Facilitation Plan:

Students participating in the programme will have a dedicated Education Abroad Team who will be able

to assist the students from their first enquiry through to the issuance of their transcripts and beyond. In

addition, all students will receive a full orientation; advice and individual assistance with their module

selection; full access to the Study Abroad social programme – including visits to major London attractions

and trips throughout the UK and Europe - much of which is subsidised by Westminster; and access to all

of the services and facilities open to regularly enrolled students. This includes library and computing

facilities, academic learning support, careers advice, on-site health services and sport facilities amongst

others.

The Education Abroad Team will be responsible for ensuring Waseda are fully aware of Westminster's

administrative procedures and that Waseda is informed of any problems their students may encounter. In

addition, the Education Abroad Team is responsible for ensuring that Waseda is kept up-to-date with any

changes to the programme.

Credits:

In order to fulfil the visa requirements, students will be required to study full time whilst at the University

of Westminster. Unlike the Japanese education system, the UK credit system is not based on contact

A full time pattern of study will normally require a student to study 60 credits per semester,

which will generally consist of 3 separate modules of 20 credits each.
