Summary:

Opportunities for Learning through Experience

Stony Brook University prides itself on the access its students have to research opportunities within the institution. Many faculty members are leaders in their fields, and are always willing to accept students into their laboratories, direct a reading project, or establish an independent course of research for any interested student. Students from Stony Brook University have had their work published in important scientific and social scientific journals, presented their research at conferences and been awarded prestigious national research fellowships. Students can obtain credit for research done with a faculty member and in some cases may be paid as research assistants.

Students will also have the opportunity to participate in any of the more than 200 student clubs and organizations on campus and may participate in numerous campus-wide activities scheduled annually for all students (lectures and seminars, social activities, athletic events, student clubs, Homecoming, among others). Through SBU's Volunteers for Community Service program in the Career Center, students may participate in volunteer activities at organizations on Long Island. Some of the most popular volunteer programs are Habitat for Humanity and mentoring for local children.

Facilitation Plan

Students will participate in a one day orientation program prior to the start of classes to acquaint them with the resources on campus, and meet key faculty and staff who will be assisting them while they are in residence. During the orientation session, students will meet with have an opportunity to finalize their course selection. The Office of International Academic Programs will also provide advisory services on curricular and extra-curricular concerns of students.

During the academic year, students will have the opportunity to participate in programs designed to help them adjust to life at the university. Additionally, the University's Charles B. Wang Center for Asian and Asian-American culture, offers a multitude of Asian programming for the university's community.
