The SAS courses do not have specific entry requirements, so they are a very popular choice for Study Abroad and Exchange students from all over the world. Opportunities for Learning through Experience

Lund University is the largest university in Scandinavia with 47,000 students and a vivid student life. With more than 8,000 international students, the academic environment is truly international, and a good place to improve your English.

As a foreign student in Lund and Malmö, you will have many opportunities to meet new people, get to know a different culture, and if you would like, also a new language – Swedish. You will experience new things, discover different aspects of life and meet people with different ideas, values and views on life. Lund University offers lots of activities both within the academic and social life. In order to help you settle down and adjust to Swedish everyday life you can apply for a student mentor. The mentor system engages students at Lund University to help you out with practical matters and to guide you into Lund's student life.

To study in Lund means that you can be a part of a stimulating life as a student with associations, unions and nations, debates, parties, film and theatre, spex, student evenings with famous people etc. You will be offered to take part in the range of different activities and in the nations and student unions. An active life makes it easier to study, and facilitate for you to make new friends and gain social competence.

Following an old tradition, the social life of the university is organised into "nations". Historically, each nation was the social and academic centre for students from a different region of Sweden. Today, all students, including international students, join one of the student unions and one of the nations upon arrival in Lund. The nations offer many activities and programmes, including sports, movie screenings, weekly pub nights, student choirs, and holiday parties. Each nation has an international secretary who helps international students become involved in nation activities.

All university facilities are available to you, such as libraries, computer facilities, sports hall and gym. The libraries hold a collection of some 7–8 million volumes, and provide researchers, teachers and

students access to extensive digital resources. Each department offers computer facilities to international

students. Lund University has Sweden's largest facility for gym and aerobics.

The student unions have houses in recreational areas by the sea and in the countryside at their disposal.

buildings (or rooms, if staying in a studio apartment)

In general the standard of student rooms in Lund is high. All rooms are completely functional and the

majority have private toilets and showers as well as Internet connection. However, since the number of

and/or make their own arrangements for Internet access.
