Program Summary

Program students will take regular university courses while receiving targeted language instruction and academic skills support.

Students with qualifying English proficiency test scores may have greater flexibility in taking PSU regular courses. There is no program restriction what electives they take; however, PSU departments may put restrictions (major, class standing, and matriculation) on the elective courses.

Students are also invited to take "Community-Based Learning" classes at Portland State University. These classes help our students learn more about Americans and American society.

*1Portland Center Course:

- is a course we offer to our in-bound study abroad students and is open to other non-program PSU undergraduates.
- has no prerequisites.
- is centered around the culture and geography of Portland and how it is the same and different from other places in the United States.
- offers students to practice research writing presentations and other academic skills.
- is not a straight ESL class but an applied skills class to assist students with their regular PSU courses
- awards ESL/English Language credits

Housing and Meal Plan

PSU Housing:

Dormitory room (single or double, based on availability) ranging between \$2,210-\$5,270 per term. The application fee is \$50 (non-refundable) and you also need to make a \$140 deposit (refundable) at the time of application. Students have kitchens to do their own cooking or they can enroll in meal plan on campus. Most furnished rooms on campus are double-occupancy and we try our best to pair you with a non-PC roommate (but not guaranteed)

- *Program students may be paired with other international students in the same/suite room.
- *Waseda students may also be paired with other Japanese students in the same room and/or unit.

Homestay:

Homestay is a great option for students who look forward to spending time with their host and are willing to adapt to the culture and lifestyle. Homestay fee is \$235/week and the application fee is \$390.

Other Opportunities on Campus

- Portland State University is famous for its "Community Based Learning" courses. These courses are open to Portland Center students and are an opportunity for them to work on a project with Americans that benefits a local community non-profit. The Portland Center staff helps students find volunteer placements in Portland. Our students have volunteered as Japanese language assistants at local schools, helpers at the local animal shelter, and as playgroup leaders for children at the state refugee center.
- Portland State has many student organizations/clubs that our students may join.
- Social activities and events are offered each term. Examples are NBA games, bowling games, and cultural events/festivals.

Facilitation Plan

The Portland Center Office serves students Monday-Friday from 9am-5pm. All staff serves students in one capacity or another (e.g., advising, assisting with registration, resolving housing problems, etc.). There is avery high level of academic and personal support for Portland Center students.
