Academic Seminars

These seminars include academic planning, study skills, and writing skills.

Volunteer Placement Program: Learning Through Experience (Requires a minimum of five participants.)

The Volunteer Placement Program places students with a volunteer opportunity based on personal interests and skills. Placements will be communication based so students can use their language skills and develop insight into an aspect of Canadian society that they would not be exposed to through English or academic studies.

Gaining an awareness of one's own cultural perspectives and beliefs enables the development of intercultural understanding and competencies. To provide students with knowledge of cultural theories so that they can better understand their volunteer experience within a Canadian context, the Volunteer Placement Program includes registration in the course, INT D 137: Academic and Intercultural Communications. This course focuses on developing intercultural competencies and effective communication skills. Through intercultural dialogues, presentations, and forums, students practice respectful communication across cultures, fostering empathy and adaptability. They will tackle challenges through case studies, preparing for success in an interconnected world. Emphasis on academic integrity, cross-cultural communication and understanding Canadian contexts fosters inclusivity. Students

gain critical thinking skills, proficiency in utilizing resources, and intercultural abilities,

January – April Notes

Students who successfully complete EAP 136 in the Fall Term are well prepared to begin regular university studies at the University of Alberta. In the Winter Term (January to April), these students may register in up to three regular credit courses. If INT D 137 is one of the credit courses, students can take up to four academic courses in this term. Student who complete INT D 137 during the Fall Term are eligible to register in up to five regular credit courses in the Winter Term. Please note that additional fees apply for registering in a fourth or fifth course.

May – June Notes

Students can take up to two regular credit courses from May to June, each worth 3 credits. The second course would be an additional fee.

Housing and Food

The University of Alberta has a variety of housing options. Students can choose a shared apartment-style residence or a single room with a private bathroom and shared kitchen. Students can opt to cook their own meals or can dine out at various food outlets on campus. Food costs are in addition to residence rental fees. Facilitation Plan

IVSP students can meet with a program advisor at the International Service Centre which is open Monday through Friday. IVSP advisors counsel students on issues ranging from academic (course selection, academic success, tutors) to personal (immigration, homesickness, health care). Students receive a personalized airport welcome and IVSP Program Assistants (student staff) provide social and cultural opportunities and actas cultural ambassadors for students.

Students also receive support from the Academic Advisor, a University of Alberta faculty member, who conducts seminars for students on study skills and writing for University courses. The Academic Advisor is also available by appointment to meet with students on individual issues related to students' academic performance.

Academic Performance

Tutors are available for most academic subject areas at the University and the program advisors can assist students in arranging a tutor. Students would pay the tutor directly.

Credits

Students will be responsible for the final transfer of credits to Waseda. This programincludes English language courses and a volunteer placement for which special credit arrangements might be necessary. Regular credit courses and INT D 137 are worth three credits at the University of Alberta. EAP 136 has no UAlberta credits but willbe graded with a letter grade. The Volunteer Placement will be graded Pass/ Fail with no letter grade. With the successful completion of each course, students can obtain between 15 and 27 University of Alberta credits.

Targeted IVSP Seminars and Workshops and the Student Engagement Centre

Students receive personalized support from the application through program completion. Individualized advising appointments and seminars and workshops focusing on topics such as student success and intercultural communication guide you to success at UAlberta.

The Student Engagement Centre (SEC) connects students with the University of Alberta, local organizations and the community of Edmonton. By engaging with these extended communities, students build fluency and confidence in their language. On campus, we support and offer a safe and inclusive environment for individual or group study, and larger rooms for skill-building workshops.
