Aotearoa New Zealand has four seasons, but extremes of temperature are unusual. Temperatures in Auckland range from an average of 20°C in summer (December to March) to 11°C in winter (June to August).

ELA is located in a modern building on the University of Auckland's City Campus, in the centre of Auckland city. The Customised Study Programme at the University of Auckland helps students improve their English skills and broaden their understanding of Language, Arts, and International Business.

Students begin with a 17-week Foundation Certificate in English for Academic Purposes at the English Language Academy (ELA), followed by a break to explore New Zealand and participate in the University's International Student Orientation. Waseda University students then study for one semester at the University of Auckland, enrolling in up to four full-time courses (60 points) from the Faculty of Business and Economics and/or the Faculty of Arts.

Entry Requirements:

Language requirements:

For entry into the English Language Academy (FCertEAP), students must meet the following TOEFL or IELTS score requirements at the time of application:

An overall score of 60 in the TOEFL iBT with the Writing score of no less than 18 and the other band scores of no less than 12

OR

An overall score of 5.0 in the IELTS academic with the writing score of no less than 5.0 and the other band scores of no less than 4.5.

Academic requirements:

Student must have completed at least one full-time year at Waseda University and have a better-than-average academic record (equivalent to a B average at the University of Auckland.)

- Nationality limitations (if any): N/A
- No Graduate (Master & Doctor) students

For Entry into The University of Auckland (Student Abroad programme - COP):

- Successful completion of FCertEAP
- ➤ Have achieved a cumulative grade point average of 2.7 on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent.

Students who did not meet the above requirements cannot advance to The University of Auckland (COP) in the second semester and must take another FCertEAP at ELA.

(A student visa application fee will be required due to the necessary visa change)

Academic English Study at ELA

ELA's undergraduate pathway programmes are designed to prepare you for your university studies through English. This is direct entry programmes. This means that when you successfully complete this with the required grade, you will meet the English language requirements for entry to the University of Auckland.

Students will complete the Foundation Certificate in English for Academic Purposes (FCertEAP) over 17 weeks. This pathway programme will build on their current level of academic English and be well prepared for their undergraduate studies. They will be in small classes with other students who will be going on to study at The University of Auckland.

The FCertEAP programme covers the following:

Writing: academic styles, essay structures, paragraph writing, introductions and conclusions, cohesive devices, summary writing, editing, writing reports, academic conventions, and academic genres.

Listening and Reading: speed reading strategies, patterns of organisation, making local and global inferences, note taking, strategies to cope with unknown vocabulary, summarising main ideas, listening for stressed words and phrases, and synthesising.

Vocabulary/Language: academic vocabulary, prefixes and suffixes, review of grammatical tenses, focus on correct spelling, focus on grammatical accuracy, and variation in sentence patterns.

Speaking and Research: formal oral presentations, use of PowerPoint, referencing, and research strategies.

Class type: Integrated

Course length: 17 week

➤ Class hours: Total 400 hours (20 hours per week); Plus optional workshops available and self-study(2-3 hours every day)





FcertEAP Class timetable

Morning Session: 8.15 – 10.15am & 10.30 – 12.30pm (20 hours) OR Afternoon Session: 1 – 3pm & 3.15 – 5.15pm (20 hours).

All students receive 20 hours of tuition per week for both General English and Academic English courses, which is made up of two hours of core classes and two hours of elective classes per day (Total 4 hour daily).

Students will be placed in either the Morning Session or Afternoon Session depending on their level of English. Please note some students in the group may have classes in the morning and some students may be in the afternoon, and session placement is subject to change based on study courses and academic block schedules.

Students will receive their General English class timetable on their first day at ELA, and they will receive their Academic English class timetable prior to begins the Academic English course.

Customised Study Programme at the University of Auckland

Waseda University students will spend one semester studying at the University of Auckland upon meeting the entry requirements. As New Zealand's leading institution, the University of Auckland offers a unique academic environment for students interested in international business, arts, and related fields.

New Zealand is an excellent place to study international business given the dependence of its economy on international trade and investment. New Zealand's exports are renowned in markets such as Japan's while foreign investment and inbound tourism play a major role in the New Zealand economy.

Policymakers and academics, Japanese included, give much attention to the 'New Zealand model'. Study at the University of Auckland also offers Waseda University students a distinctive insight into Maori (Polynesian) culture and those of Europeans settled in a remarkable new environment.

International Student Orientation Programme

The Orientation will present Waseda University students with information about living and studying at The University of Auckland, offer advice on strategies for getting the most out of University studies and introduce students to the unique culture, beautiful landscape around Auckland City and also to other international students.

Credits at Waseda University

Students will generally undertake a standard full course load in The University of Auckland (four courses, 60 points total). Students must be mindful of student visa requirements and credit issues at Waseda University. The credit issues should be confirmed with the student's home faculty at Waseda University.

While 200- and 300-level courses are available, please note that these are more advanced. It's advisable to prioritise 100-level courses to ensure a manageable workload. (For example, ACADENG 104 is a 100-level course. EDUC 213 is a 200-level course)

Study abroad students (COPOS) can now directly enrol into most courses (some exceptions apply). However, student should apply for "concession" to enrol in courses that require Auckland faculty approval. In this process, faculties assess whether their prior study meets relevant course prerequisites and notify them accordingly. In some occasions, they may be asked to provide course outlines/syllabi in English for courses equivalent to Auckland prerequisite requirements.

Students going to the University of Auckland for the English and Study Abroad programme (COPOS) will typically be placed with an English Language Academy approved homestay for the first four weeks. This enables Waseda University students to live with New Zealand families, experience the 'Kiwi' lifestyle, and practice English in an everyday situation.

Then with the assistance of the English Language Academy staff, students may choose to move to alternative accommodation or continue in homestay. University Residence accommodation is available during one semester of study at the University of Auckland (subject to the availability of places). Advice can also be provided on renting accommodation for single or shared use.

ELA Homestay

Homestay accommodation is a great way to learn about Aotearoa New Zealand culture and to practise your English in a friendly and relaxed environment when the students are enrolled in ELA. Families are selected on the basis of providing such support and are experienced in caring for students from many different cultures. In a homestay you live with a family, have your own room, and 2 meals (breakfast & dinner) on weekdays and 3 meals on weekends are provided. Most homestays are within 70 minutes from the ELA by public transport (Bus fare \$4-7 per way).

The main criteria for homestay placements include:

- ➤ The family is English-speaking.
- > The family is able to provide a well-furnished single room for the student.
- > Dietary requirements of the student are taken into account.

NOTE:

Some of our families host more than one international student, including those from your country who may be from the same group. This allows the students the chance to share their home with another student, while ensuring each student has their own private room.

University Accommodation

Living in University Accommodation is a great way to immerse yourself in campus life as you adjust to a new environment.

Students are mostly placed in a single room at self-catering and mixed-gender accommodation unless they request special arrangement to the University of Auckland accommodation office.

Waseda students will receive guidance regarding the schedule of submission of the University Residence applications once the course commence. Students are required to submit the application and will need to express their interest with their application form before the due date. They will be paid a deposit to secure a place at the time of accepting an accommodation offer from the University of Auckland Accommodation team.

Students can receive a full refund of accommodation deposit and placement fee for any accommodation withdrawal made due to an unsuccessful application for university admission. Students must email the Accommodation Solutions Team at accom@auckland.ac.nz with their full name and Student University of Auckland ID number, indicating that they wish to withdraw and the reason for their withdrawal. The University does not accept withdrawal applications over the telephone; they must be in writing from the person whose name is on the residential agreement. If students withdraw for any other reason, University of Auckland Accommodation withdrawing/changing policy will apply.

Note:

- (1) There will be a compulsory one-off charge of Residential Services Fee that must be paid prior to checking in. This fee covers year-round community engagement activities, access to the University Recreation Centre, and laundry facilities and must be paid for each new residential term
- (2) The period of the university residential agreement is fixed. Students will be required to pay for the accommodation for the full period they have agreed to even if they arrive later than the start date or leave prior to the end date. All credit card and debit card payments will incur a 1.9% Convenience Fee. This will be added automatically when you make your payment.

Pastoral Care of Students

The University of Auckland English Language Academy has agreed to observe and be bound by the Code of Practice for the Pastoral Care of International Students. Copies of the Code are available from the NZQA website at www.nzqa.govt.nz. A team of pastoral support staff are available to help and provide assistance for all students studying at the ELA.

Learning Support - ELA Study Centre

ELA's Study Centre offers various opportunities for students to improve their English skills. This is the central hub for students to access a range of interactive and engaging activities both inside and outside the school. Students can practice their English conversation with Meet2Chat sessions, led by University of Auckland volunteers twice a week. They can also attend workshops on a variety of topics such as employment skills, academic language skills, spoken communication skills. These are run three times a week by experienced facilitators and are adapted to suit the needs and goals of students.





ELA Extra Curriculum Activities

Our students can join a range of free activities including our most popular Meet2Chat! This is a special activity where students can have conversations with English speakers from the University of Auckland. Our students take part in quizzes, short presentations and have many other fun opportunities to practice speaking and listening. ELA students can also book one-on-one tutorials with our teachers and during the tutorials they can get tips and advice on how to develop their English skills.

ELA Social Activities and Special Events

Students can participate in a wide range of activities organised by the Student Services team. The activities are weather dependent and vary by time of year but can include the University of Auckland campus tour, Auckland art gallery, Auckland Memorial War museum, Auckland Domain Wintergarden, Mission Bay, Mt Eden walk, Devonport, One Tree Hill, movies and beach trips. Information is provided to students during the Orientation Programme and on the ELA social activities noticeboard. An additional cost applies to most activities.
