Program Overview

The **CS-L program** at Lawrence is dedicated to helping students improve their English proficiency while pursuing academic study in areas of their interest. Students may choose courses in a wide variety of disciplines, such as anthropology, economics gender studies, film studies, environmental public policy, international studies, music and many more. CS-L students study with Lawrence students in classes, live with Lawrence roommates in the residence halls, and are encouraged to work with peer tutors and mentors. The program supports students in making rapid English progress so that they may use English to study widely, engage in campus social life, and pursue individual goals.

Lawrence University is one of 40 American colleges designated as “colleges that change lives.” Author Loren Pope believes that these colleges do as good a job as (if not a better job than) Ivy League or other “name-brand” institutions at transforming students by pushing them a great distance. The CS-L program at Lawrence is part of this tradition: the program encourages students to improve English by pursuing their passions and exploring new interests. Students may choose to focus on one area of study, such as economics or international relations, that they are passionate about. Alternatively, students may choose to explore a variety of classes at the same time, thus developing multi-faceted interests. As a small campus, there are also many opportunities to experience a full and enjoyable college life: make friends, join clubs, participate in athletics, engage in music lessons or ensembles, and more.

Academic Study

Note: IS = International students may also enroll; OE = Open Enrollment

Fall Term

- **ESL – Experiential Language Learning (IS; observe OE course)**

Students observe a regular course and complete projects in order to develop English language proficiency in a specific field of study.

- **Learning in the liberal arts (IS discussion section; OE lectures)**

This course introduces students to the process of liberal learning through the careful reading and discussion of works in the humanities, arts, natural sciences, and social sciences. Students meet once per week for a public lecture or performance with all Lawrence University freshmen.

- **Introduction to American Society I (IS)**

This course meets once per week in fall term, and is an introduction to American life. Students explore American values, attitudes, and patterns of behavior through formal study, structured observation, volunteering, and interviews of Americans.

Winter Term

- **Intercultural Communication (OE)**

This course explores intercultural communication from a linguistic perspective and focuses on the ways that language is used differently across and within cultures. We will examine the components of intercultural communicative competence, how norms for communication styles vary between speech communities, and how language relates to culture and identity. We will become better intercultural communicators through conversations, group work, and interviews with peers and community members.

- **Two Elective courses (OE)***

Students choose from a variety of electives in areas of their individual interest. Choose from courses in the humanities, social sciences, arts, and sciences. CS-L students may also take classes at Lawrence's famous conservatory of music.

- **Introduction to American Society II (IS)**

This course meets once every two weeks in winter term and focuses on learning about the Appleton community.

Spring Term

- **Optional ESL Course – English for Specific Purposes (IS)**

A project-based course where students focus on achieving individualized English language goals, such as improving English for professional purposes or study in a specific academic discipline.

- **Optional ESL Course – Experiential Language Learning (volunteering option)**

Learn English through a 20-hour volunteer experience in the Appleton community.

- **Introduction to American Society III (IS)**

This course meets once every two weeks in spring term and focuses on learning about the history and origins of cultural diversity in Wisconsin.

- **2 – 3 electives (OE)***

Students choose from a variety of electives in areas of their individual interest. Choose from courses in the humanities, social sciences, arts, and sciences. CS-L students may also take classes at Lawrence's famous conservatory of music.

Housing and Meal Plan

All Lawrence students live on campus! CS-L students join this vibrant and active campus community by sharing a room with a Lawrence University student. Lawrence offers seven residence halls and has a choice of meal plans that allow students to get meals in the cafeteria, café, and campus store.

Opportunities for Learning through Experience

Waseda Mentors Program: Lawrence student mentors help CS-L students adjust to campus life, make friends, and learn about clubs and other campus activities.

Lawrence International: Lawrence International organizes holiday events, formal dances, "International Cabaret," international meals, and a variety of other social opportunities for international and American students. It is a great way to get involved, learn about other cultures, and contribute to the campus.

The Lawrence CS-L Program Events: The CS-L program sponsors interactive cultural events, such as American holiday celebrations, Japanese cooking, and off-campus field trips.

Friendship Family Program: Students may choose to be matched with a local family to share in American family life: meals, holiday celebrations, children's parties, outdoor activities, etc.

Volunteering: Volunteer opportunities abound in the Appleton community, including at local art centers, schools, homeless shelters, and more.

Lawrence Organizations: Get involved in one of Lawrence University's many clubs! These include sports, hobbies, social, political, musical, and academic groups.

Varsity sports: Students may join Lawrence competitive sports teams, including tennis, soccer, swimming, fencing, rowing, and many more.

Facilitation Plan

Program Director: The program director is in regular contact with the students. She also keeps drop-in office hours for students who have questions, concerns, successes to share, or just need to talk. Since it can be difficult knowing where to turn for help in an unfamiliar environment, students are encouraged to contact the director for help with any aspect of their life at Lawrence. She is then able to direct them to the appropriate campus offices or personnel and act as a cultural mediator and even translator.

Program Assistant: A part-time Waseda program assistant provides additional office hours, assistance, and support.

American Society Course: This course meets every week Term I and every other week Terms II and III and is led by the program assistant. In addition to formal study of American culture, the course provides students with the opportunity to discuss their experiences adapting to American culture and the Lawrence campus.

Academic Advisors: Each student has a Lawrence faculty academic advisor to help plan their program of study for the year.

The Center for Academic Success: Student tutors can help polish writing assignments, work on speaking and conversation skills, answer questions about class content, or give advice on how to best prepare for an exam. This extensive array of individualized learning opportunities is one of the great benefits of studying at Lawrence.

Term I: 16 units (2 1/3 term credits)

Term II: 19 units (3 1/6 term credits)

Term III: 16 – 19 units (2 1/3 – 3 1/6 term credits)

(One Lawrence term credit is equivalent to 3.3 semester credit hours)

Optional Winter Break Housing: \$474 for the entire break (prorated for students wishing to stay for part of the break).

Optional December Term

Lawrence offers an optional 2-week December term during the winter break. Students have the option to take brief, intensive courses that are not offered during the academic year. Courses are 3 units of credit and include workshops or fieldwork. These courses are not part of the regular tuition.
