Language Requirements:

English requirement for non-EFL (academic course only) (CS-R) ;

IELTS 6 (minimum of 5.5 in all components)

We do now accept the TOEFL for students applying to our Study Abroad programme. For acceptance onto our programme we would look for an overall score of 78 with Listening: 17, Reading: 18, Speaking: 20, Writing 17. For TOEFL Scores taken since the test grading changed, we require an overall 4.0 (Minimum Score of 3.5)

To accept the IELTS or TOEFL the test should have been taken within the last 2 years.

Academic Study

Open Enrolment (CS-R)

The programme is almost entirely made up of standard, undergraduate level modules that are open to regularly enrolled students. This allows Waseda students to study alongside UK and other international degree-seeking students and fully integrate into University of Westminster life. However, Waseda students are not restricted to studying modules from just one degree, all Waseda students are permitted to take modules from more than one school so that their programme can be tailored to meet the requirements of Waseda University in order to transfer credit. Individual rooms (not shared) with en-suite bathrooms are available at Harrow and individual rooms with shared bathrooms are available in Alexander Fleming. All halls have 24-hour security and have a secure swipe-card entry system. Students have access to a shared kitchen where they can prepare meals. Please note that Halls accommodation is not guaranteed, but Waseda students are nearly always allocated accommodation. Please note that Marylebone Hall is still closed for refurbishments for 2026-27.

Facilitation Plan:

Students participating in the programme will have a dedicated Education Abroad Team who will be able to assist the students from their first enquiry through to the issuance of their transcripts and beyond. In addition, all students will receive a full orientation; advice and individual assistance with their module selection; full access to the Study Abroad social programme – including visits to major London attractions and trips throughout the UK and Europe - and access to all of the services and facilities open to regularly enrolled students. This includes library and computing facilities, academic learning support, careers advice, on-site health services and sport facilities amongst others.

The Education Abroad Team will be responsible for ensuring Waseda are fully aware of Westminster's administrative procedures and that Waseda is informed of any problems their students may encounter. In addition, the Education Abroad Team is responsible for ensuring that Waseda is kept up-to-date with any changes to the programme.

Credits:

In order to fulfil the visa requirements, students will be required to study full time whilst at the University of Westminster. Unlike the Japanese education system, the UK credit system is not based on contact hours. A full-time pattern of study will normally require a student to study 60 or 80 credits per semester, which will generally consist of 3 or 4 separate modules of 20 credits each. Students can choose to study 3 or 4 modules depending on their preference. There is no difference in cost.

Internship (CS-R):

Students can also choose to take an optional internship for one semester if they wish, as part of their programme. They would take the internship alongside the academic classes they study at Westminster. They would work for 14 hours a week, in an industry and role of their choice (they must provide 3 choices on their application and be satisfied with any of these 3 roles or industries). They would also study a 20 credit Business module, "Professional and Personal Skills Development", which applies the skills they have learnt in their internship to an academic environment. This module will count towards one of their 3 or 4 modules for the semester. Students can take the internship in their first or second semester. The internship lasts for one semester only. This will enhance students' employability and kick-start their future international career.

There is no additional fee to take the internship.
