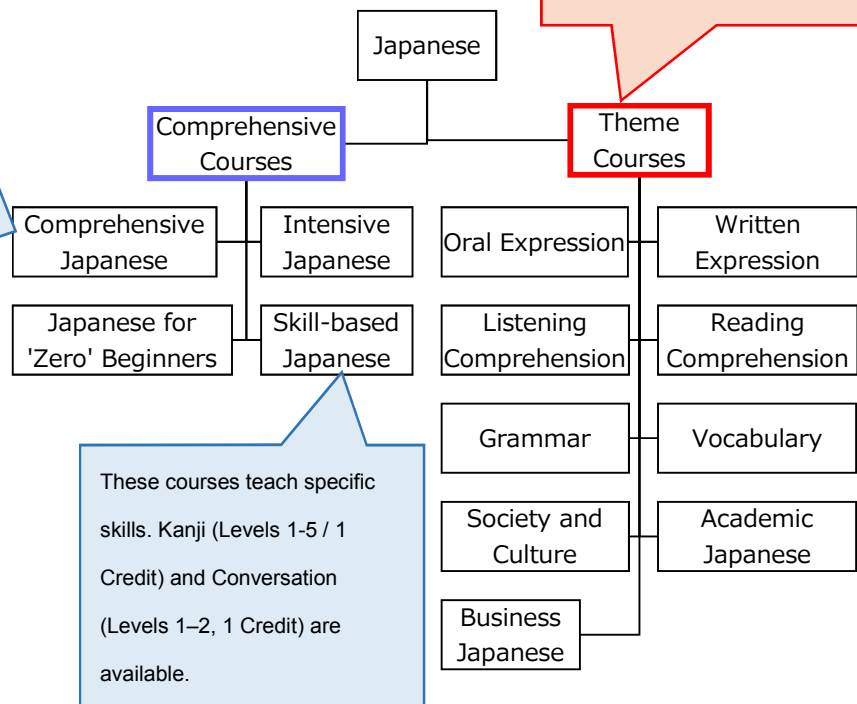


(1) The Registration Guidebook/Course Syllabus is divided into two sections: I. Registration Guidebook and II. Course Syllabus.

(2) Classification of Japanese Courses

These are comprehensive Japanese courses conducted using a textbook. For those who want a program of all-round study (reading, listening, speaking, and writing), pick Comprehensive Japanese (Levels 1–6 / 3–5 Credits), Intensive Japanese (Levels 1–2 / 10 Credits), or Japanese for 'Zero' Beginners (introductory level / 2 Credits)



These are Japanese courses based on a specific theme (Levels 1–8 / 1–3 Credits). Choose themes that match your interests.

(4) Model course selections

Notes:

1. Everyone is free to choose the courses they want to take. However, depending on your school/graduate school, there may be recommendations on the types of courses to take. Please check with your school / graduate school.
 2. Choose courses that match your level and interests.
 3. For those from introductory level to level 6 who want a program of all-round Japanese study, first choose the Comprehensive Courses.
 4. Intensive Japanese is conducted through 10 classes across five days each week. Please be aware that this is a fast-paced course.
 5. Kanji Courses (Level 1–2) are divided into Kanji (For Native Kanji Learners) and Kanji (For Nonnative Kanji Learners).
 6. Themed courses may vary in the content of classes and the amount of testing and homework.
Be sure to check the syllabus and confirm the details of the class.
 7. Consider the balance of the courses you are taking and avoid taking on too much.
- ☞ (e.g.) Courses above your level + courses below your level
 Courses with a lot of homework and tests + courses focusing mainly on class activities
 Courses with a lot of input + courses with a lot of output
