Q10. Types of accommodation available to exchange students and estimated fees

Dartmouth College houses exchange students in dorms on campus. The majority of students are assigned to double rooms while a few are assigned to single rooms. All student rooms contain a twin bed, wooden desk, desk chair, dresser, a bookcase for each student, and a closet or wardrobe. Other features in each room include local and domestic long-distance telephone service, computer ports with Ethernet connections, and access to approximately 60 television channels. General community amenities in dorm buildings (or a group of buildings known as a "cluster") include a common kitchen, and study and lounge spaces. Each cluster has an ice machine and a microwave, both of which are usually found in the kitchen. The clusters also have at least one lounge that contains a television and

DVD/VCR player. The common spaces and amenities are for all community residents to use. These spaces can be used for private studying or get-togethers, as well as for community programs sponsored by the community student staff or other College organizations. Additional services and items in individual residential buildings include vending machines containing snacks and beverages, public phones, and recycling areas.
