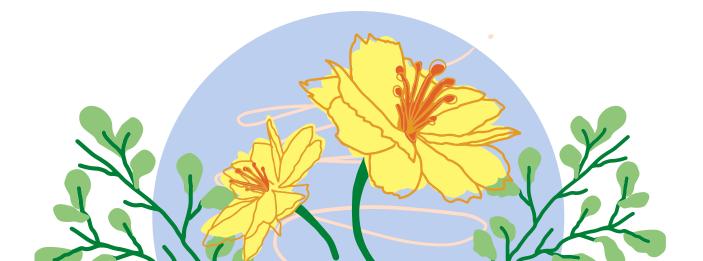
Should I say something?

The theme for this month is "goodbye." This is a word that involves different emotions, a word that I want to leave to the university, the dorm, my friends, and Tokyo. Some say that "See you" is better than a "Goodbye", but I personally don't want to make promises I can't keep. It makes me uncomfortable to leave these lingering ties uncut.

That is why I was content when my fellow editors told me about this theme because it felt like we were on the same page.

That was a long introduction, so now I am going to jump into the topic.

I might be that type of person for which social interaction is not at the top of the priorities list, but believe it or not, I am not cold-hearted. It is true that I am not going to attend the university's graduation, and I didn't even join the graduation photoshoot. I just prefer staying home and hanging out with my parents' cat instead of taking pictures that I am not going to look back at. Just to clarify, I really did make some lifelong friends in university. For others, it might be the people that you say goodbye to, but for me, something that I really want to bid farewell to are the trees in Tokyo: the trees that make us realize the beauty of the change in the seasons.



I grew up in the countryside of Kyushu Island. The tallest building in the town was school. On the sides of the pathway to the school, there were cherry blossom trees and ginkgo trees. My parents' garden is filled with fragrant olive trees, weeping plum trees, chestnut trees, and hydrangeas. It was not the best-maintained yard, but still, it was truly beautiful. The trees would soak up the bright sun and absorb the abundant rain of Kyushu, so they grew at a pace that made it impossible to maintain. It was the same for the trees alongside the roads. During spring, there would be tunnels that cherry blossom trees would create above the roads, and it was one of my favorite views. It seemed like the stars were raining when I laid down on the ground and gazed at the wisteria flowers that grew near my school.

When I moved to Tokyo, the trees of this city crushed my heart. I could not stand seeing the fragile branches of the tiny trees, which would only get to see the sun for the blink of an eye because of the shadows of skyscrapers. When the change in season comes around the corner, the differences between the trees that don't get a fair amount of sunlight, and those who enjoy the privilege of the sun becomes more noticeable. While the latter is blooming and the soft leaves are luxuriating, the former that only gets the setting sun grows at a slow pace. However, it was always the trees that didn't get as much sun that survived the longest. They remind me of the long-distance runs I had to do throughout the six years of middle and high school. I was always the last one and alone, just like those trees.



In early mornings the birds fly in groups, and when they come out from the shadows of the skyscrapers and enter the morning light, for a few seconds their feathers shine like silver. When I first saw that, it took my breath away. It almost made me feel ridiculous when I compared myself to them, flying high with their shiny wings, and me trying to fit into the city with my high heels. I suppose this magical phenomenon only happens during sunrise, as I have never seen it during sunset. Just like the famous quote from 'The Pillow Book' by Sei Shonagon, the best time during winter is in the early morning. If you get the chance to wake up at sunrise, I really want you to pay attention to this phenomenon. Just like the birds shine with the sunlight, so do the trees shining in breathtaking golden color. Yet, the beauty of the trees comes with a little bit of melancholy; the birds can fly towards the sun, but the trees just have to wait in one place until the sun rises.

Do you know the difference between "hayashi" (林) and "mori" (森), two words for "forest" in Japanese? You might think that size is what makes them different, however, it is the fact that "hayashi" are made artificially, and "mori" is a natural habitat. The trees in a "hayashi" are planted at the same time, so they grow at the same pace; they blossom, change color, and shed their leaves all together. On the other hand, "mori" is composed of different trees of various ages and types, so they grow at their own pace and go through changes at distinct times.

If you think about it from this perspective, the trees of the city are living in a "mori."

I am sorry for pitying you, for thinking that you were unlucky that the skyscrapers are taking up your sunlight, and for assuming that you are starving yourselves because of the barren soil. It was just me who compared you to the other trees and perceived your existence as a miserable one. You are just living to your fullest and showing this bland city the changes of the seasons without a complaint. You are spreading your roots in the forest of the city.

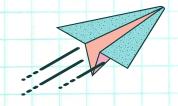
As I leave this city that I've lived in for over two years, reflect upon what I have gained here under these trees.

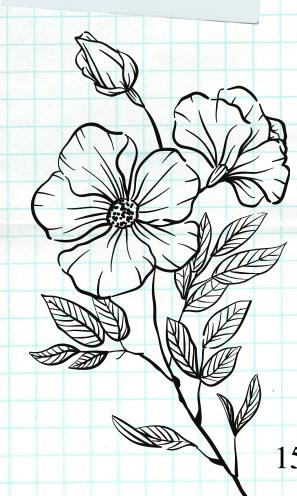
4. How do you deal with depression and sadness?

Drinking coffee in the morning. I feel like caffeine makes me stay awake.

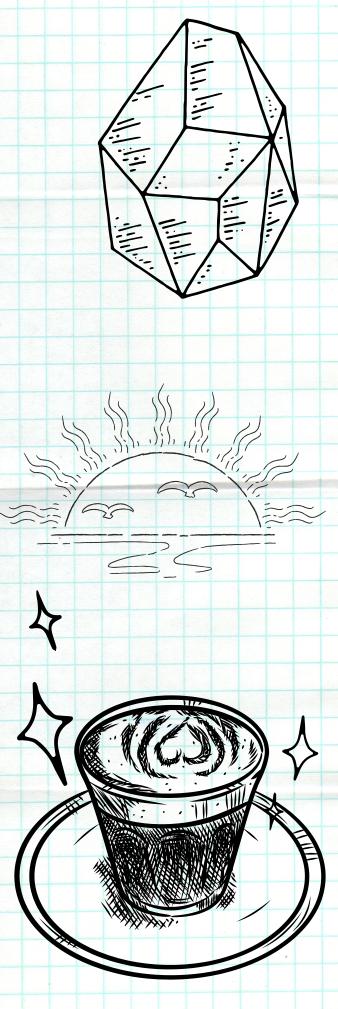
9. What are your goals after graduating from college?

8. When is your happiest moment while living?

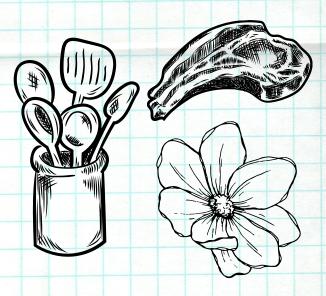
I love to cook and watch my lovely plants grow day by day.

I want to know your motivation to live.I don't want to study anymore when I think about finding a job. "Then stop everything!" I just think in my mind, but I don't have the courage to do that. At the same time, I feel pressured from the pride of being a Waseda student.

The desire to be praised by someone is not the main point. No matter what you do, the most important thing is to take responsibility for your choices. In short, no matter what happens as a result of job hunting or not doing it, do not blame others. I think it's very unpleasant to blame others or complain about the environment when the result is inconvenient for you. It is important not only to get a job, but to think seriously and make a decision about what is the best for you. The pros and cons of finding a job really depends on each person, sometimes it is on your luck. It's not like "do your best and leave the rest to fate," but I think that living a college life where you can talk to people with confidence is the best you can do.

Finally, about the question of motivation for living, in my case, it's all about having fun and fulfilling your life every day. I try to work hard every day because I want to make today a fun and fulfilling day.

Certainly, I became a Waseda student, and I had similar pressure on job hunting like you. I went through the route of "leaving a good school, getting a job at a good company, and burying bones there," which is a traditional Japanese idea, so job hunting is part of that process. I went through the same route too. As for me, job hunting was like a ritual to maintain an average status in the Japanese society. I didn't have any other commitments during my job hunting, so it didn't bother me to spend time just on job hunting. If I had other priorities, however, I would choose to do that. Anyways I think it's fine for me. In fact, what you are thinking of "I'm not interested, but I'm just looking for a job to get a job" will be noticed by the employer.

To be honest about internships or part-time jobs, I think it doesn't matter what you decide. (I don't think there is any significant difference in the first place).
