How do you spend your free time? The theme of this WISHTimes is "Irotoridori na Akijikan (Colourful Autumn Season / free time)", so I would like to introduce how to spend my free time during this season. The special place where I can spend my free time is <Uni.Cafe 125> in the university. This cafe has a good location where you can spend a pleasant time. Besides, I work part-time here.





This cafe opened in 2002 to commemorate the 125th anniversary of Waseda University. The place is right in front of Okuma Garden. The glass-walled exterior is designed as an open space where you can see the greenery of Okuma Garden from any seat. There is also an open deck where you can enjoy your meal while feeling the breeze. Also, it's cozy when the sunlight shines through the shop. There are more than 80 kinds of beverage menu, you can enjoy bagel sandwiches, daily lunch, and handmade sweets.

• Beverage menu

The most popular bevarage is Waseda Blend. It is an easy-to-drink coffee with a good balance of bitterness and acidity, containing branded beans such as Colombia, Santos, and Mandelin. It is great to enjoy reading or working with a warm cup of coffee.

The drink I would like to recommend is a cream caramel latte. Since it contains espresso, the sweetness of the caramel matches with a little feeling of bitterness. You can enjoy it as a dessert with whipped cream. You can choose hot or cold, but I recommend hot drinks for the coming season. The whipped cream on top melts into the hot coffee, allowing you to enjoy a different taste. The rich sweetness of caramel is perfect for the chilly season.

Handmade sweets

All the sweets in the cafe are handmade in the shop. Gateau chocolate, chiffon cake, pound cake, scones, pumpkin pudding, etc. Gateau chocolate is a moist cake with a rich chocolate filling, which is especially popular among children. The flavour of pound cake differs depending on the day, such as blueberries, bananas, caramel, and apricots. The cakes also change daily, such as carrot cakes, fruit tarts, and crumble cakes. So you can enjoy various sweets no matter how many times you go. Seasonal sweets will also be available. Sweet potato tarts are recommended in the fall.

Mr. Ogawa, the store manager, is quite specific about handmade and additive-free products as much as possible. As introduced above, we make all the foods and desserts in the store. We make syrups for smoothies and dressings too. When purchasing ingredients, Mr. Ogawa will look for additive-free products, and use only products that contain natural ingredients. Since this cafe is close to the university, there are many students and professors. Furthermore, a wide range of customers will come by our cafe while visiting Okuma Garden. Because food is something that enters into our body, we want to provide products that give peace of mind to everyone's health.

On the first day, a person from Rakuten USA talked about new values and perspectives on business for us. Besides, we had lectures by the venture capital manager who is leading the global society. From the second day, the dormitory students were divided into groups and prepared presentations to promote a business plan towards Rakuten USA. Therefore, this time, the participants would like to share their learning experiences gained during the training.

On the first day of the training, I was struck by the high level required from the beginning and seriously wondered if I could achieve it for a week. However, I soon realized that having such agony was pointless.

Based on the theme of "Service That I Want", my teammates and I had "24/7" discussions to create a business pitch to Rakuten USA. Introducing the History of Nakano

 you go down Waseda Avenue towards campus and pass by Nakano broadway, further pass by the Arai-Yakushi arcade, and finally Cocos, you will find a cute cafe called "Hito-Iki-Cafe-écailler"(ひと・いきカフェ エカイエ). Behind that small wooden door is a safe space for everyone. The owner will give you a warm welcome, with a delicious meal or even dessert readily waiting for you. Cafe écailler is a shared cafe, meaning that different owners serve distinct meals every day. In case you are craving a specific meal, the cafe publishes a monthly calendar showing who is going to host the cafe.

I have always wanted to go to Cafe écailler but never had the chance to do so since I was always in a hurry when passing by on the way of my commute. On the very last day of summer break, I decided it was time to give it a try. I had a delicious pumpkin soup along with perfectly toasted bread and made conversation with the owner of that day. Later on, Ms. Nakamura, who is knowledgeable in the History of Nakano, entered the cafe. We started talking, and what she told me was too interesting, so much so that it almost made me feel guilty just to keep it to myself which is why I decided to share it with my fellow WISH residents. Below is a summary of some of the research I did and the interview

[Nakano Kennel]

Back in the Edo-period, when Tokugawa Tsunayoshi was a shogun, he issued the "Orders on Compassion for Living Things". This order prohibited the killing of all living things including dogs. His empathy for stray dogs was profound enough that he built kennels outside Edo, in what we now know as Nakano, Okubo, and Yotsuya. The Kennel in Nakano was the largest, standing in Nakano from 1695 to 1709 a total of 15 years. According to some official documents, 20,000 to 100,000 dogs were kept in Nakano. The statues of dogs in front of the Nakano-ward office were made in memory of these kennels.

The construction of kennels started near Zero-Hall, but expanded from Nakano all the way to Koenji as more and more stray dogs were admitted. The Kennels are also called "Okakoi-goyou-yashiki" in Japanese, and is the namesake of "Kakoi-Cho", the area around Nakano 4-Chome.

The next issue will include a story about the elephant in Nakano during the Edo period!
