## Speaker's Profile

Christine Marran is Professor of Japanese Literature and Cultural Studies at the University of Minnesota in the Department of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies. She is currently Visiting Professor at Yale University at the MacMillan Center. Her current research lies within the disciplinary frame of ecocriticism. Her most recent book, Ecology Without Culture: Aesthetics for a Toxic Age (University of Minnesota Press, 2017) argues that environmental thinking requires a critique of cultural humanism. Introducing her concepts of the "biotrope," "ethnic environmentalism," and "obligatory storytelling," Marran shows how cultural ideas, which work at a humanistic scale usually toward human interest, can impede our ability to speak about the more-than-human world.

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
